

Fibers on the Flathead Registration Information

The preferred method of registration is online. You will be able to see which classes are available and reserve your spots immediately. If you don't have a computer, try to find someone who does to help you. If that won't work for you, call Carole Baginski at 406-890-0199, no earlier than January 15, 2016.

Before registering online, you will need to go to www.paypal.com to sign up if you do not already have an account. It is a free service that helps safeguard your transaction.

HOW TO REGISTER

You are encouraged to register early to ensure greatest selection of classes. Once a class maximum has been reached, registration for that class will close but a waiting list will be kept.

Pre-plan your registration. At www.mawsonline.org/index.html, you will find these instructions for registering. Start with the Registration Planning Form that shows what each conference option includes. Pre-conference attendees who are just taking either Beginning and Rusty Spinners or Silk Tasting may use the Ala Carte section to sign up for the class and their meals and lodging. People from either conference who are not planning to stay at the camp may also sign up for the Thursday evening BBQ dinner under the Ala Carte section. Also note the Special Requests section at the bottom. All meals will have vegetarian options at no additional charge, but for more specialized diets, the camp needs to know in advance and charges a daily fee, regardless of the number of meals a person will be eating.

Bonnie T's Latest Projects



At left, "Woven Words Blanket in Four Panels. Words depicted are LOVING KINDNESS, JOY, COMPAS-SION, EQUANIMITY. Although you can't 'read' those words, the letters are counted out in each panel. The warp is Weavers Wool from Mountain Colors and the weft is doubled, one strand of Jaggerspun 18/2 merino and one strand of winter lace from Mountain Colors. I was planning (obviously not well enough) to make three 28" panels. After I finished weaving the first panel, I realized I had not taken into account drawing in. I was aiming for the finished dimensions 84"x 86". The finished blanket measures 84"x100".

Nows from our Guilds



From the Missoula **Weavers Guild:** Submitted by Heather Torgenrud

November Meeting - We were informed and inspired by Martha Newell's presentation on the weavers of Nepal at our November guild meet-

She set the stage with background information about the country and its diverse culture, before talking about Ganesh Himal Trading, a wholesale import company that has sold Fair Trade goods from the region for many years.

The folks who started Ganesh Himal Trading also founded the Conscious Connections Foundation. Martha is on the board of that nonprofit organization, and one of its objectives is to better the lives of weavers and other artisans in Nepal. Another is to support education there. I found the personal stories Martha told especially meaningful—like that of the woman who cried when she received her first paycheck from the local fair trade cooperative. She had never been allowed to handle money before and had never had any money of her own. The cooperative helped her start a savings account, which she eventually used to better her family's situation and put her children through school. She wove on a rustic counterbalance loom, such as we might call a barn loom, equipped with a fly shuttle, and produced about a meter of cloth per hour.

Martha shared first-hand stories of how the earthquake in Nepal last spring devastated the country and lives of the weavers, many of whom lost their homes and looms.

She brought "hand-made in Nepal" items for sale and many guild members did some holiday shopping to help a worthy cause.

Martha noted that many of the items she brought to sell are also available at the Jeannette Rankin Peace Center's store at 519 South Higgins. – Heather

I was last in line to select a variegated tencel yarn from her stash so was working out of my color comfort zone, using charcoal, mauve and rust, I added individual threads here and there of bright red and teal to jazz up the warp and define the ikat areas. The weft I chose was 30/2 deep rose pink from Redfish dye. The scarf ended up to be rather long, 72 inches. (Bonnie, did you mention how long we were to weave them?? I had thought 80 inches on the loom.) I added two different crystal and sterling beads to the fringe for sparkle because the only time I wear scarves is when I dress up. At long last, I have woven my first wearable! And plain weave was perfect for this project.







In December, the Prairie Handspinners Guild were invited to the Shepherd Elementary School to demonstrate spinning for their Colonial Days event. Each student received a stick spindle and fiber and learned how to use them. We had so much fun! Thank you to Margaret Wiser, Kathryn Petersen, Heather Larkins and Heather Johnson for doing such a great job with all the kids and demonstrations.

Report to the MAWS Board Mountain Colors Dye Day Hosted by the Missoula Weavers Guild Sponsored by the Montana Association of Weavers and Spinners

Our Mountain Colors Dye Day was a huge success! Thank you MAWS for providing a Workshop Grant, and owners Diana McKay and Leslie Taylor, and staff Lynette Thomas and Brenda Garrett of Mountain Colors for hosting us. We had a full house on November 7, 2015, with some traveling icy roads to get there.

Notice about the workshop was posted on the MAWS website as well as being publicized in the July 2015 MAWS Newsletter. Registration by email opened on September 1st and we had our limit of 24 participants before noon, with 8 on the waiting list. As it turned out, some individuals had to drop out so anyone on the waiting list, who was still able to attend, was able to participate. Pre-workshop day communication was done via email and everyone seemed to think that worked well.

Mountain Colors agreed to charge us \$250 for their services, which was to cover the cost of hiring extra help for the day, as well as cover the cost of the dye. The only stipulation by Mountain Colors was that everyone would purchase yarn from their on-hand selection. Leslie Taylor reported that we went through gallons of dye. The award of the MAWS grant (\$250) offset the cost of the workshop to Mountain Colors, but with hiring staff and purchasing dye, and electricity, probably did not cover all their costs.

Initially we were asked to let Mountain Colors know ahead of time, what yarns we would be using in case some had to be pre-wound. Because of the volume being requested, Mountain Colors staff decided not to pre-wind orders, but have participants select yarn of the racks when they arrived. This caused some confusion as not everyone had brought their lists and could not recall skein pricing. Eventually everyone was able to make their selections and by 10:00 a.m. we were off to the dyeing room. Anticipation levels were high as we began pulling skeins out of the washers and hanging them on wooden racks. The outcome was beautiful and surprising; everyone seemed pleased with their results.

Participants were asked to send their comments on the workshop, and these are to follow. At this writing, 12 of the 24 have submitted comments. Among those 12, 51 skeins were dyed. Everyone who provided input for this report stated that the staff at Mountain Colors were amazing as they talked us through choosing our yarns, how to add dyes to our skeins, getting our items into the steam trays and rinsed out.

Hopefully, we will see some of our yarns turned into projects we can admire and share at the MAWS Conference 2016, Fibers on the Flathead, in June of 2016.

Sampling of comments:

- "I loved being able to see what the other participants chose for color combinations. My pictures of the yarns on the drying racks did not show how glorious all the skeins looked in person!!"
- "..it was a bit congested but well handled. With so many people I think it may have been a bit hard for the first timers to hear and see the demo, and to grasp the idea of how to blend colors.
- "Registration and pre-info were excellent! I was able to get 8 skeins dyed. Maybe limit participation to 20 next time or split into two groups with morning and afternoon sessions."

History of the Montana Association of Weavers and Spinners

The beginnings of the Montana Association of Weavers and Spinners (MAWS) date back to late May, 1981, when the Missoula Weavers' Guild held a day-long conference attracting about 130 weavers. A proposal to have a regular statewide activity was passed on that day, so it was considered the first MAWS meeting. An attempt to hold a conference in Great Falls in 1982 was canceled due to limited enrollment, but the organizers persisted, working with the Montana Institute of the Arts. Publication of a newsletter began almost immediately. In 1982, the group obtained non-profit 501 c3 status and held another conference.

After a few years, the decision was made to hold conferences every other year, in even years to alternate with the years of the biennial conferences held by the Association of Northwest Weavers' Guilds. Six different Montana regions have taken turns planning and hosting the event.

On July 9, 2004, by-laws of the organization were amended to expand the focus of the organization to include a broader spectrum of fiber arts, including weaving, spinning, felting, basketry and associated fiber arts. The name remained Montana Association of Weavers and Spinners.

The organization's "purpose is to promote and encourage fiber arts throughout the state of Montana, and to help fiber artists forge links to their peers" (as stated on the MAWS website.) To help fulfil that commitment, MAWS developed a website under the Association of Northwest Weavers and Spinners website in 1998. In late 2006, MAWS created its own website, mawsonline.org, after filling the website coordinator position that was approved at the August 2006 general meeting in Bozeman. The website includes quarterly MAWS and guild newsletters, photos and information from the state's guilds, updates on conferences and events, links to Montana fiber artists and businesses, and classified ads. It will also be the online registration site for the MAWS 2016 Fibers on the Flathead conference. This website has served as a finding tool for aspiring and new-to-the-state fiber artists, families who have inherited fiber arts equipment, and people looking for fiber artists for educational or production purposes.

How guilds can apply for a MAWS grant

 - How you liked it/or didn't
 - Some photos if possible
- Anything else you think might be useful!

The intent is to give future workshop planners some concrete information about the instructor, their classes and teaching success.
